

Institutional Arrangements for the Circular Economy and the Sustainable Use of Natural Resources CONCEPT NOTE

Background and rationale

The post-pandemic economic recovery offers a strong opportunity to accelerate the transition from a linear to a more sustainable, circular model. Discussions often surround circular business models, waste and recycling methods or pollution reduction. Yet, the institutional preconditions required for an effective circular economy and the implementation of SDG 12, "Responsible Consumption and Production", are rarely discussed. At the same time, it requires strong governance to create a regulatory framework that incentivizes sustainable resource use rather than hinder the circular transition. Often neglected and dismissed as a solely environmental concept, the idea of a circular economy demands cross-cutting implementation across the entire administration. A successful transition towards a circular economy can only be achieved through extensive coordination, collaboration, and communication between every administrative level, across all ministries, from municipal to national. These cooperative efforts are at the centre of SDG 17, "Partnerships for the Goals."

Session objectives and expected outcomes

Governmental actors and other stakeholders will discuss how to harness synergies between the different governmental institutions and share best practices on basic administrative requirements for policymaking in the circular economy context. We will hear from different parts of the UNECE region on the establishments and implementations of Circular Economy regulations to conclude best practices and analyse the way forward on this rarely discussed matter. Furthermore, the event will mark the launch of the emerging multi-stakeholder network connecting policymakers and other circular economy actors to promote the sharing of experiences and cooperation in the field.
